

ESA Year 14 Art Direction Pathway

Craftskills Traineeship

ESA has joined forces with ScreenSkills (The UK's industry-led skills body) and the National Film and Television School to open a Centre of Screen Excellence at ESA, bringing new 'into industry' courses for students aged 18 to 19 (a new set of qualifications for year 14).

These specialist courses include work placements and workshops from leading industry professionals and are designed to increase knowledge, skills and access for students who want to work in TV and Film. ESA is thrilled to provide for the second year running these creative and technical traineeship from September as a new UK Centre of Screen Excellence.

Level 4: Professional Diploma in Technical and Production Practice for the Creative Industries

The UAL Level 4 course runs in tandem with the ScreenCraft course and aims to give

students an additional qualification. Students will complete an extended project after the ScreenCraft course has been completed.

APPRENTICESHIPS

- Apprenticeships are very competitive and are not offered for all careers. The Apprenticeship Standard that links to Art, Textiles, Graphics and Photography are:
 - Advertising and Marketing;
 - Creative and Digital Media,
 - Design, Fashion and Textiles,
 - Furniture, Furnishings and Interiors,
 - Photo Imaging,
 - Product Design and Development,
 - Social Media and Digital marketing.

Use the Apprenticeship Standard titles to search for apprenticeships on your Unifrog account.

- Apprenticeships come in a variety of levels from Level 2 (GCSE level) up to Level 6 (Masters degree level).
- Companies pay an apprenticeship wage alongside the cost of the apprenticeship so this is a good option.

NOTE: Students who have studied a Level 3 UAL will not be able to apply for equivalent level 3 apprenticeship.
